When did you first seek medical care abroad and where did you go?

"...it was in 2018. It was in (the) Philippines on a small island, for dental work. And I was really pleasantly surprised. Very nice modern office, all computerized, everything, and I remember here at that time – 2018 – it would've cost me close to \$2,000, something like that to do some basic work at that. And over there, I think it was done for about \$300. That was the first time. So really good job. *- Michael Djavahery*

Why would a person choose to go abroad for care?

"The medical system here is broken, the healthcare system is broken here and they charge and overcharge so much. I mean, why would you charge \$1,200 for a crown? It doesn't make sense when you go to a different country and you do a couple of crowns for under \$300..." - *Michael Djavahery*

So you're saying that even with all the hotel and travel, it was still cheaper...

"Yes. You go sightseeing. You spend a month abroad. You're having fun and you do the procedure ... I was thinking at the time I was gonna do it and spend a month - just in case there's complications - so I can come back to see the same doctor ... " – *Michael Djavahery*
